Information for authors

About the journal

The journal *Nordic Studies in Mathematics Education* – Nordisk Matematikdidaktikk, NOMAD – is a journal publishing results from research in mathematics education. It addresses all that are interested in following the progress in this field in the Nordic and Baltic countries, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, Iceland, Latvia, Lithuania, Norway and Sweden. The main objectives of the journal are to stimulate, support and foster Nordic and Baltic researchers and post-graduate students in mathematics education and thereby contribute to the development of mathematics teaching and learning in theory and practice at all levels of the educational system. NOMAD depends on people volunteering to do the important work of reviewing without any economical compensation. NOMAD publishes articles based on theoretical analysis as well as on empirical studies, reports on results from research projects and research-based developmental projects.

An article in NOMAD should be of high quality and contribute to the development of the field in the Nordic and Baltic region. The article should have a clear theoretical basis or originate from clearly defined assumptions. Most manuscripts submitted to the journal are not immediately accepted for publishing, but authors will be requested to do minor changes or substantial rewriting based on the reviewers' recommendations.

Submission and the review process

The manuscript is to be submitted in the editorial manager system tidsskrift.dk. An author submitting a manuscript to NOMAD will normally receive notice of reception within two weeks. The manuscript will be assigned to an editor-in-charge, who will take care of all further communication with the corresponding author regarding the article. The editor will make a first evaluation of the article to see that it complies with the guidelines for NOMAD. If the outcome of this evaluation is positive, the article will be sent to reviewers. Each manuscript will be reviewed by at least two persons. Based on reports from the reviewers the editor produces a final review report with a decision. This is sent to the author(s) and will be visible on tidsskrift.dk. The outcome will be one of the following:

1. *Publish* [Accepted submission]
2. *Publish after minor revision* [Revisions required]
3. *May be published after major revision* [Resubmit for review]
4. *Re-write and re-submit the manuscript* [Resubmit elsewhere]
5. *Not accepted for publication in NOMAD* [Declined submission].

Technical issues for authors

Articles published in NOMAD should be original and not be published or under review elsewhere. By submitting an article authors give their consent to publication.

Language

Articles submitted to NOMAD should be written in Danish, Norwegian, Swedish or English. The first page of the article should include an abstract of about 100 words and the last page should contain

an abstract in English, if the article is written in a Scandinavian language. A separate file should be supplied, comprising the names and addresses as well as a short biography for each author (academic title or position, affiliation, main research interests).

Length, typesetting and naming of files

Articles should contain at most 40 000 characters, including spaces but not the list of references. You may include appendices, uploaded separately. Manuscripts should be submitted as Word-file or similar, be doubled spaced with Times 12 points, and use wide margins to allow for editorial notes. Please use row numbering in the document. Headings, diagrams, figures and illustrations should be included in the manuscript. Use at most three heading levels and no numbering. Figure title texts are placed below figures and table title texts are placed above tables. When photos and illustrations are used make sure to include the best possible quality.

The manuscript must be submitted as a blinded document (anonymized version in which the author's name and references to the author's work have been removed, and also removed in the meta-data). The anonymized version will be used in the review process, which is double blind (both reviewers and authors are anonymous). Manuscript files should be named using the *two first words in the title* and submitted in the editorial manager tidsskrift.dk.

Citations and references

NOMAD follows, with some minor exceptions, the guidelines presented in *Publication manual of the American Psychological Association* (7th ed.) (2019). Basic guidelines for the most common types of references are presented below.

References in the text should state the author's name and publication year within brackets; (Winsløw, 2004). If direct citations are made, the reference should also include page number; (Winsløw, 2004, p. 62). References should be listed in alphabetical order at the end of the article. The doi-number of a reference should be stated with the full https-address. Doi-numbers can be found at <https://apps.crossref.org/SimpleTextQuery>

A book reference should use the following style:

Blomhøj, M. (2016). *Fagdidaktik i matematik*. Frydenlund.

Articles or chapters in anthologies are referred to in the following style:

Grønmo, L. S. (2004). Are girls and boys to be taught differently? In B. Clark et al. (Eds.), *International perspectives on learning and teaching mathematics* (pp. 223–236). National Centre for Mathematics Education.

A journal reference should use the following style:

Skott, J., Zoest, L. van & Gellert, U. (2013). Theoretical frameworks in research on and with mathematics teachers. *ZDM*, 45 (4), 501–505. <https://doi.org/10.1007/s11858-013-0509-3>

Plagiarism

For all figures, tables and longer text passages published elsewhere, the author is requested to obtain permission for both the print and online format. All material without evidence of such permission is assumed to belong to the author(s). No data, text or theories by others should be presented as if they were the author's own ("plagiarism").

If AI is used in any part of the manuscript, this must be declared.

Self-plagiarism

References to your own previously published works should be treated as other publications. Presenting previously published work by the author/-s as new is treated as "self-plagiarism".

Some important exemptions to this general rule should be noted: NOMAD accepts submissions based on (part of) a master thesis, a Ph.D. thesis and/or a paper in a conference proceeding, since we consider transforming such texts, produced as part of a learning process, into a proper academic journal paper to be a sound and meaningful academic activity. The requirement is, that any such relation to a previously produced text is explicitly and clearly stated in the NOMAD submission.

By submitting a manuscript to NOMAD the authors assure that the manuscript is neither published elsewhere nor submitted for review in any other journal.

Ethics

When applicable, ethical approval for empirical research must be obtained.
